1. Why did SU adopt a new policy? Doesn't the niversity already accommodate students who obseve religious holidays?

Yes, the University has longstanding parctice of reasonablyccommodating students who seek adjustments in their academic classelsprograms due to the observance big ious holidays.

In the 2019 legislative session, the Washington Start Legislature passed and Govrer Inslee signed into law Substitute Senate Bill 5166 that amend 28.2W 28.10.039 and require colleges and universities to adopt policies requiring faculty to reasonably accommodate students who, due to the observance of religious holidays, expetito beabsent or endure a significant hardship during certain days o
